





The Legislature by enactment at its 1908 session created the County Board of Education and made it obligatory upon that board to organize and maintain a County High School at the coun y-seat of each of their respective counties, and same to be established within two years from the enactment of the law.

In compliance with that law we the unersigned members of county board of education now announce to the public that a county high school has been established at Morgantown, at which any boy or girl of the pupil age who can pass a satisfactory examination upon the common attend free of tuition; that this school is a four years course and includes Mathematics to Trigonometry, Latin to Cicero and Virgil, the Natural Sciences, including Geology, 2 years Literature, and a diploma from this chool will entitle the holder to enter the State University with

out academic course there. The first examination will be held at the school house on the second Friday and Saturday in January, 1910; the second on the second Friday and Saturday in May, 1910, and those passing this examination will be awarded county diplomas of graduation from the common schools. These examinations will cover whole of the common school

Applicants who desire to attend the High School free of tuition will be required to take this examination, but may be admitted till that date upon preliminary examination by the professors and trustees in charge

. Those above the pupil age will be admitted to the school upon the same terms as county cadets except they will have to arrange for tuition. Also pupils desirin; to take common school branches only will be admitted to the school, and competent teachers have been employed to instruc it will be impossible for him to in all branches, but those taking only common school branches will have to arrange for tuition. We wish to make it plain as to who are entitled to free tuition in the High School: It is those nder 20 years old who have passed a satisfactory examina tion upon the common school fear that an opening up of the branches and are resident of the county and who when they entor take up and pursue the High School Course.

One of the most effective means of securing kiege-crops of fruit is spraying. Fruit trees of all kinds are subject to many injurious tracets and discuss, which if left to themselves will materially lessen the yields. There are two kinds of insects—biting and sucking. The former can be combated by means of poisons sprayed upon the leaves. The sucking insects of which plant lice are the most common examples, cannot be killed in this way, since they drill into the plant and suck the juices. The most effective remedy for them is some insecticide which will kill by contact, like kerosene emulsion. This is made by dissolving half a pound of soap lu a gallon of boiling water, adding two gallons of kerosen and clurring the mixture violently until the oil is thoroughly mixed with nine times as much water before the soapsude. This is diluted with nine times as much water before using. It may be applied with a spray pump whenever the lice are trouble-
