Great Awakening On the Subject of Tax Reform.

Many States Taking Steps to Abolish Old Methods in Favor of Better Kentucky's Case.

There is no question of greater importance before the people of Kentucky at present than the question of taxation. Those who have interested themselves in studying the growth of the state's industries during the past year and watched the attempts to develop its resources have been deeply impressed with the fact that our

think about what kind of overhauling he wants done. He invariably reaches the conclusion that the starting point should be the constitution of the state.

At Work in Ohio. This sort of unrest as to taxation matters is widespread. In Ohio the State Board of Commerce is engaged in actively advocating an amendment to the Ohio state constitution. There is also a tax commission, which has an official existence, engaged in holding hearings all over the state and giving citizens of every occupation a chance to air their views on the subject. The difficulty in Ohio is very similar to the difficulty in Kentucky. They are restricted there to the general business of the state, and are planning an amendment which will allow the legislature to separate the sources of revenue. Ohio is, to raise the state revenue from the sale of property, thereby leaving other classes of property to be taxed for local purposes only. Ohio has tried before to set up a general tax commission, but it failed, but now, in an opinion, may be formed by the legislature given by the tax commission, is very satisfactory.

Minnesota Makes Progress. The people of Minnesota at their last election voted in that state a constitutional amendment which would have removed all limitations as to the power of the legislature in relation to taxation. The legislature at the session just closed passed a measure recommended by the governor for the purpose of putting into effect the provisions of the constitutional amendment. One of those provisions provided for a permanent tax commission to recommend amendments to the revenue laws. The other measure imposed a recurring tax on mortgages of one-half of one per cent. This measure was adopted by the legislature of the state of New York. Under this act the tax on one-half of one per cent is collected on the mortgage as it is recorded, and the mortgage is thereafter exempt from taxation. Old mortgages have been registered on payment of one-half of one per cent to the state. The act also exempts from further taxation in both Minnesota and New York mortgages of existing mortgages.

Needs Thorough Study. No state needs to have the tax question thoroughly studied and studied in the light of the experience of other states, as well as with due regard to its own experience, more than does Kentucky. For fifteen years since the new constitution was adopted, we have striven hard to realize that dream of uniformity in taxation which is the aim of every citizen. We have not succeeded in doing this. It is true the revenues of the state have increased, but the tax burden has not been heavy on some classes of property while others are free. The amount of money which is raised by taxation is ridiculously small. The burden of the tax returns to itself upon comparison with the reports of the deposits in the banks. The only kind of personal property that does not escape taxation is that visible, tangible personal property, found chiefly on the farms. The farmer has to pay for his horses, cattle and farming implements, so he has to pay, while the man in town can hide his money, or his stocks and bonds, and escape his share of the burden. This will, in any way of the case, while human nature remains as it is. It is incumbent upon Kentucky to find some way of deriving a revenue from this elusive class of property.

It is probably safe to say that for Kentucky to reach the point of relieving in the policy of separating the sources of revenue, selecting one class of property from which to raise its state revenues, another class of property from which to raise its city revenues, and a third class of property from which to raise its county revenues, is to be believed, by the experience of Kentucky, that is what we are to come to some time, though it may be far in the future. We must well continue to adhere to a tax not which is being abandoned by other states and which, if persisted in, will put us in the position of handicapping our property owners of every class with a burdensome tax system, which will be the least heavily burdened property owners of other states. It is, at least, worth while for Kentucky to be studying the question and taking seriously about it.

ROUND TRIP FOR HALF FARE

Railroads Announce the Lowest Rates For Kentucky State Fair.

With seventeen big exhibition departments, amusement features that cannot be excelled, and a speed program worthy of special mention, the State Fair at Louisville, Sept. 16th to 21st, should be the largest attended gathering in the history of Kentucky. The only one thing needed to make the condition ideal was low railroad rates, and this has now been fixed. The railroads in Kentucky have announced a rate of one fare plus twenty-five cents for the round trip, tickets going on Saturday before the Fair week, and good returning the Monday following Fair week. Tickets to Indiana will be sold on the Kentucky basis of one and a third fares, inasmuch as the regular rate in Indiana is two cents a mile.

CAPTIVE BALLOON ENGAGED.

To be strictly up to date and enter to the minds of all the Kentucky State Fair management has not only concluded negotiations for a passenger-carrying airship and balloon-coach during the week of Sept. 16th at Louisville, but has contracted for a captive balloon, which is to carry passengers in the air every ten minutes. This was one of the sensations of the St. Louis Exposition, and will undoubtedly prove a good drawing card at State Fair, the week of Sept. 16-21.

For the first time in the history of a State Fair in Kentucky, a handsome ribbon was made to the county number of ribbons. This is the largest number of a sterling silver plate happily engraved, valued at \$200. It is to be placed, for three months after the Fair in the custody of the judge of the county, which receives it. Later it is to be hung on the walls of the old capitol and, ultimately, in a room in the new capitol.

"The rich man who, with hard arrogance, declines to consider the rights and the needs of those who are less well off, and the poor man who excites or indulges in envy and hatred of those who are better off, are alike alien to the spirit of our national life."

"No individual, no corporation, obeying the law, has anything to fear from this administration."

"In the last six years we have shown that there is no individual and no corporation so powerful that he or it stands above the possibility of punishment under the law."

"There is unfortunately, a certain number of our fellow countrymen who seem to accept the view that unless a man can be proved guilty of some particular crime he shall be counted a good citizen, no matter how pernicious his doctrines or his practices."

"But there is a growing determination that no man shall amass a great fortune by special privilege, by chicanery and wrongdoing, so far as it is in power of legislation to prevent, and that the fortune when amassed shall not have a business use that is anti-social."

"There is no objection in the minds of this people to any man's earning any amount of money if he does it honestly and fairly, if he gets it as the result of special skill and enterprise as a reward of ample service actually rendered."

"Our aim is to help every honest man, every honest corporation, and our policy means in its ultimate analysis a healthy and prosperous expansion of business activities of honest business men and honest corporations."

"I earnestly hope the legislation which deals with the regulation of corporations engaged in interstate business will also deal with the rights and interests of the wage-workers employed by them."

"In any government, such as that in which we are engaged, nothing is more necessary than sanity, and the refusal to be led into extremes by the advocates of the ultra course on either side."

"There exists no more sordid and unlovely type of social development than a plutocracy, for there is a peculiar unwholesomeness in a social and governmental ideal where wealth by and of itself is held up as the greatest good."

"One of the favorite devices of those who are really striving to prevent the enforcement of those laws is to clamor for action of such severity that it cannot be undertaken because it will be certain to fail if tried."
