Corp. Edward M. Paup, who was killed in line of duty in England on March 21, 1945, was accorded full military honors as he was laid to his final resting place in St. Mark's Episcopal Cemetery near Honey Brook yesterday. The military ritual was in charge of Honey Brook American Legion Post 422 and Honey Brook VFW Post 5997.

Funeral services were held from Archie S. Maclean's funeral home in this city at 2:30 with Rev. George S. McKinnley, rector of St. John's Episcopal Church at Compans, officiating. The services were largely attended.

Commander John Glauner of the American Legion Post, and Commander Howard Patterson, Jr. of the VFW post officiated at the military rites at the grave. Members of the two posts acted as guard of honor at the funeral service and the grave.
