do hereby make application to the Commissioner of Pensions for a pension to be granted me under the Act passed by the 33rd Legislature of the State of Texas, and approved April 7, 1913, on the following grounds:

I enlisted and served in the military service of the Confederate States during the war between the States of the United States, and that I did not desert the Confederate service, but during said war I was loyal and true to my duty, and never at any time voluntarily abandoned my post of duty in the said service; or (that I was in the service of the State of Texas during the war, to protect said State against the Indians and Mexicans for more than 6 months). That I was honorably discharged or surrendered

1865 at the close of the war

that I have been a bona fide citizen of this State since prior to January 1, A. D. 1900, and have been continuously since a citizen of the State of Texas. I do further state that I do not hold any National, State, city or county office which pays me a salary or fees of \$300.00 per annum, nor have I an income from any other employment or other source whatever which amounts to \$300.00 per annum, nor do I receive from any source whatever money or other means of support amounting in value to the sum of \$300.00 per annum, nor do I own in my own right, nor does any one hold in trust for my benefit or use, nor does my wife own, nor does any one hold in trust for my wife, estate or property, either real, personal or mixed, either in fee or for life, of the assessed value of over one thousand dollars, exclusive of a home of the value of not more than \$1000.00; nor do I receive any aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, or from any other source, and that I am not an inmate of the Confederate Home, and I do further state that the answers given to the following questions are true:

1. What is your age? *68 years*
2. Where were you born? *In McNairy Co Tennessee*
3. How long have you resided in Texas? *63 years*
4. In what county do you reside? *Henderson*
5. How long have you resided in said county, and what is your postoffice address? *In Henderson 63 - Post office Athens, Texas*
6. Have you applied for a pension under the Confederate pension law and been rejected? If rejected, state when and where. *Have never applied*
7. What is your occupation, if able to engage in one? *None* What is your physical condition? *Fair*
8. In what State was the command in which you served organized? *In Texas*
9. How long did you serve? Give, if possible, the date of enlistment and discharge *about 8 months*
10. What was the letter of your company, number of battalion, regiment or battery? *M. M. Morris's Company - Johnson's Regiment*
11. If transferred from one command to another, give time of transfer, name of command and time of service. *Was not transferred*
12. What branch of the service did you enlist in—infantry, cavalry, artillery or navy? *Infantry*

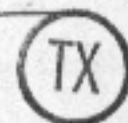
CERTIFICATE OF STATE AND COUNTY ASSESSOR

The records of this office show one B. P. Adams, not shown as Bolin Pinkney Adams, filed application for Confederate Pension in Texas in January, 1913. At that time he stated he was 68 years old-born in McNairy County, Tennessee. He had resided in Texas for 63 years.

Mr. Adams stated he served about eight months in McNam's Company, Jamison's Regiment of Texas Infantry, Confederate States Army as a private. He was discharged at Tyler, Texas in May or June of 1865.

The application of B. P. Adams was approved on the affidavits of J. K. P. Parmer and H. W. Richardson who stated they both joined the same company at Athens, Texas with B. P. Adams and they served with him in the same organization.

B. P. Adams death occurred September 10, 1921 in the home of his son-in-law, J. M. Royall in Athens, Texas. He was buried in the Fincastle Cemetery in Henderson County, Texas.

No further information of the service of Mr. Adams is given.
