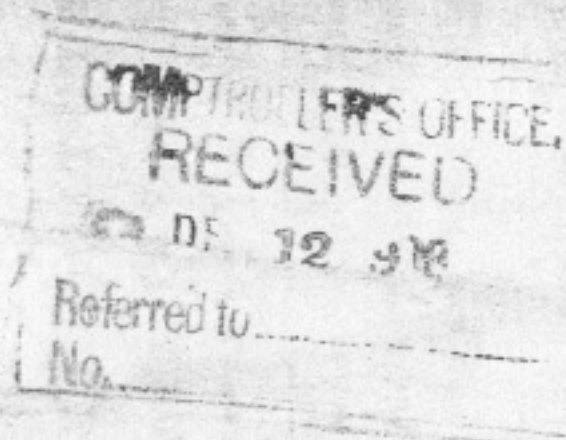

Your petitioner L. Q. C. Asher respectfully represents that he is a resident citizen of Henderson county, in the State of Texas, and that he makes this application for the purpose of obtaining a pension under the act passed by the Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Texas, and approved May 12, A. D. 1899, the same being an act entitled "An Act to carry into effect the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that aid may be granted to disabled and dependent Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows under certain conditions, and to make an appropriation therefor," and I do solemnly swear that the answers I have given to the following questions are true.

NOTE—Applicant must make answer to all of the following questions, and such answers must be written out plainly in ink.

- Q. What is your age? Answer 63 years old
- Q. In what county do you reside? Answer Henderson County Tex

- Q. What is your occupation, if able to engage in one? Answer Farming
- Q. What is your physical condition? Answer Bad health with old age
- Q. If your physical condition is such that you are unable by your own labor to earn a support, state what caused such disability? Answer Exposure and hard work
- Q. In what State was your command originally organized? Answer Georgia
- Q. How long did you serve? Give date of enlistment and discharge. Answer I was in service and taken prisoner Oct 16 1864 prison together 3 yrs 3 mo 4 days. Enlisted March 13<sup>th</sup> 1862. Discharged June 17<sup>th</sup> 1865
- Q. What was the name or letter of your company and name or number of your regiment? Answer Company F 46<sup>th</sup> Ga Regt Gen Cheatham's Div. of the Army of Gen Sherman
- Q. State whether you served in the infantry, artillery, cavalry, or the navy. Answer Infantry
- Q. State whether or not you have received any pension or veteran donation land certificate under any previous law, and if you answer in the affirmative state what pension or veteran donation land certificate you have received. Answer No. nothing whatever

- Q. What real and personal property do you now own, and what is the present value of such property? Give list of such property and value. Answer I own five acres of land assessed at \$300<sup>00</sup> One pony horse worth \$35<sup>00</sup> One cow & yearling worth \$20<sup>00</sup> Total value of all property will not exceed (including my house furniture) \$400<sup>00</sup>



- Q. What property, and what was the value thereof, have you sold or conveyed within two years prior to the date of this application? Answer *No property sold or conveyed within two years.*
- Q. What estate has your wife in her own right, real and personal, and what is its value? Answer *My wife does not own any property whatever in her own name.*
- Q. What income, if any, do you receive? Answer *none*
- Q. Are you in indigent circumstances; that is, are you in actual want, and destitute of property and means of subsistence? Answer *Yes*
- Q. Are you unable by your labor to earn a support? Answer *Yes*
- Q. Have you transferred to others any property of value of any kind for the purpose of becoming a beneficiary under this law? Answer *No. not one cent.*
- Q. Did you ever desert the Confederacy? Answer *No Sir I did not.*
- Q. Have you been continuously since the first day of January, 1880, a bona fide resident citizen of this State? Answer *Yes. 1 yr in Robertson County; 1 in Milam Co; 7 in Johnson Co; & 26 in this County.*
- Q. If you originally enlisted in the Confederate service from the State of <sup>Ga</sup>Texas, were you at the date of the passage of this act a bona fide resident citizen of the State of Texas? Answer *Yes, for 38 yrs*

Wherefore your petitioner prays that his application for pension be approved and that such other proceedings be had in the premises as are required by law.

## CONFEDERATE PENSIONS.

For the purpose of saving time and money, the following information is submitted to those who desire to make application for pensions.

County Judges are urgently requested to furnish a copy to every applicant for a pension. The object is to reduce a constantly increasing and burdensome correspondence with the pension department of this office, the force of which is limited to two clerks.

J. W. STEPHENS, Comptroller.

- I. Applications to the County Judge may be sworn to and subscribed before any official with an official seal, authorized under the laws of this State to take affidavits, acknowledgments, etc.
- II. The testimony of witnesses to proof of service, inability of support by labor of any sort, must be made before the County Judge or the County Commissioners. If witnesses reside without the county or the State of the residence of the applicant their testimony must be secured under the direction of the County Judge. Witnesses to proof of service must state the source of their knowledge of such service.
- III. The physician's affidavit must be made before the County Judge.
- IV. The application, after approval by the County Judge, must be approved by the County Commissioners at a regular term of said court. Approvals at a called term of said court are not in compliance with the law and can not be approved at this office.
- V. Pensions can begin only on the first day of April and October of each year, and applicants are requested not to write letters of complaint to this department in the belief that pensions can begin July 1st and January 1st.
- VI. Applicants who originally enlisted in Texas commands, who were bona fide resident citizens of this State May 12, 1899, and whose residence has been a continuous one since that date, are entitled to pensions, if otherwise qualified.
- VII. Applicants who enlisted in other States, and who have been bona fide resident citizens of this State since January 1, 1880 (*the date for widows is March 1, 1880*), and whose residence has been a continuous one since those dates, are entitled to pensions, if otherwise qualified.
- VIII. Confederate soldiers who are under sixty years of age are advised to postpone their application unless they can furnish proof that their disability is the approximate result of their service in the army; and can state "when, where and how" said disability occurred. Without such proof their applications, under the provisions of the law, have to be rejected.
- IX. Indigent widows of Confederate soldiers or sailors are entitled to pensions, if otherwise qualified, provided they were married to such soldiers or sailors anterior to March 1, 1866, and have never re-married. All applications that do not come up to these requirements have to be rejected.
- X. Applicants who are in receipt of Texas veteran or United States pensions are not considered to be "indigent" within the meaning of the pension law. Such applications will be rejected.
- XI. For a better understanding as to property qualifications, the following was made by the Legislature a part of the pension law: "Provided, that the word 'indigent,' within the meaning of this law, shall be construed to mean one who is in actual want, and destitute of property and means of subsistence."
