I have not remarried since the death of my said husband, and I do solemnly swear that I was never divorced from my said husband, and that I never voluntarily abandoned him during his life, but remained his true, faithful and lawful wife up to the date of his death. I was married to him on the *17* day of *July*, A. D. *1878*, in the county of *White*, in the State of *Arkansas*.

My husband, the said *John Clamon*, enlisted and served in the military service of the Confederate States during the war between the States of the United States, and that he did not desert the Confederate Service. I have been a resident of the State of Texas since prior to January 1, A. D. 1900, and have been continuously since a citizen of the State of Texas. I do further state that I do not receive from any source whatever money or other means of support amounting in value to the sum of \$300.00 per annum, nor do I own in my own right, nor does anyone hold in trust for my benefit or use, estate or property, either real, personal or mixed, either in fee or for life, of the value of one thousand dollars, exclusive of the home of the value of not over \$1,000.00; nor do I receive any aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, or from any other source, and I do further state that the answers given to the following questions are true:



To cross interrogatory #1. I served as a private soldier in the 5th Company and Regiment with John Claassen from the date of his enlistment in the U.S.A. army up to the time I was taken prisoner on the 2^d day of April 1865. I personally knew many Officers & men who belonged to the Company, and while I am not clear in my mind as to the exact date on which certain incidents took place, I still have a well defined recollection of the character & faithfulness of each member of the Company with which I served. In further answer to this interrogatory I say that I did not know any other soldier or sailor by the name of John Claassen in the Confederate army. Answer to interrogatory #2: Yes.

" " " " #3. No I do not; but I do know that he served honorably and faithfully up to the time I was captured and that only a few days remained after that time until the army of Genl. Lee was surrounded at Appomattox.

Answer to interrogatory #4. Yes! I know that he had now deserted up to the time I was captured, and I know further that I did not hear any report from any source after my return home from prison that he had deserted after the fight in which I was made prisoner at Watchers Run a few miles south of Petersburg Va.

in some way he made his escape as he was not among the number who
were taken to prison.

time he enlisted in the Confederate Army as a member of Co. E. 63rd Regt. Tenn. Infy. Some time during the year 1862. as I now remember, and up to the time he with his family moved from Sullivan County Tenn.

Answer to interrogatory #4. Yes.

" " " #5

Yes! I cannot give exact date but am satisfied that he enlisted as a private in Co. E. 63rd Regt. during the fall of 1862. at Strawberry Plains Tenn. and that he served continuously in the ranks of his Co. until about April 3rd 1865. At which time, last named. I have reason to believe he with others were separated from their command by reason of the confusion that took place among the Confederate forces at Hatchers run about the time the Army of Genl. Lee began its retreat from Petersburg Va. This opinion is confirmed by the fact that John Clamon & several others of the Regt. were not present with the small remnant of their Co. when the Army was surrounded at Appomattox April 9th 1865.

Answer to interrogatory #6. No: he was not a commissioned officer - he was a private soldier.

Answer to interrogatory #7. No: he did not perform detailed or special service of any kind - he was not a courier.

Answers by Witness N. D. Bachman to Cross interrogatories

Answer to Cross interrogatory #1. I enlisted in Co. K. 3^d Regt. Tenn. Infy. in April 1861. for a term of one year. At the expiration of this term of Service my entire Company was transferred to and was assigned the position of Co. E. in the 63^d Regt. Tenn. Infy. The 63^d was a new Regt. and was organized in the Spring of 1862. I was made Sergeant Major of the 63^d Tenn. Regt.

In the performance of my duties I was required to make requisition on the several Companies in the Regt. for men for picket duty, guard service &c. and the orderly Sergeants of all the Companies made daily reports to me in which they accounted for the whereabouts & condition of all officers and enlisted men in their respective muster rolls. If any were sick in hospital or in camp or had deserted; if any had been captured or killed or were missing, were absent without leave or had died, a perfect check was kept in this way & made a matter of record.

Some of these records were lost or destroyed - others were captured.

I have nothing now to which I can refer in the way of a record except the original roll of Co. K. and such recruits as were added from time to time after the Company was transferred to and became Co. E. of the 63^d Tenn. Regt. J. C. Claum & his brother George Claum were both recruits & although it has been a long time I feel safe in saying they came together to the Co. in the fall of 1862. George Claum drew a pension in Tenn. up to the time of his death which occurred several years ago.

Answering further I say that I did not know any other Soldier by the name of John Claum, who did any kind of service in the Army or Navy of the Confederacy.
