I, Mrs. *Victoria Spencer Hubbard*, do hereby make application to the Commissioner of Pensions for a pension, to be granted me under the Act passed by the Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Texas, and approved April 7, A. D. 1913, on the following grounds:

I am the widow of *Jim Donia Hubbard*, deceased, who departed this life on the *26* day of *Aug*, A. D. *1883*, in the county of *Henderson* in the State of *Texas*

I have not remarried since the death of my said husband, and I do solemnly swear that I was never divorced from my said husband, and that I never voluntarily abandoned him during his life, but remained his true, faithful and lawful wife up to the date of his death. I was married to him on the *27* day of *Nov*, A. D. *1877*, in the county of *Henderson*, in the State of *Texas*.

My husband, the said *Jim D. Hubbard*, enlisted and served in the military service of the Confederate States during the war between the States of the United States, and that he did not desert the Confederate Service. I have been a resident of the State of Texas since prior to January 1, A. D. 1900, and have been continuously since a citizen of the State of Texas. I do further state that I do not receive from any source whatever money or other means of support amounting in value to the sum of \$300.00 per annum, nor do I own in my own right, nor does anyone hold in trust for my benefit or use, estate or property, either real, personal or mixed, either in fee or for life, of the value of one thousand dollars, exclusive of the home of the value of not over \$1000.00; nor do I receive any aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, or from any other source, and I do further state that the answers given to the following questions are true:

1. What is your age? *71 years*
2. Where were you born? *In Weekly Co. Tenn*
3. How long have you resided in the State of Texas? *28 years*
4. How long have you resided in the county of your present residence? And what is your postoffice address? *I have resided in Henderson Co 20 years - Postoffice: Athens, Tenn. R # 1*
5. Did your husband draw a pension? If so, give his file number. ☒
6. What was your husband's full name? *Jim Donia Hubbard*
7. What was the date of his death? *Aug 25-1883*
8. In what State was your husband's command originally organized? *Alabama*
9. How long did your husband serve? If known to you give date of enlistment and discharge. *About 4 years Do not know dates of enlistment or discharge*
10. What was the name or letter of the company, or number of the battalion, regiment or battery of artillery in which your husband served? If he was transferred from one branch of service to another, give time of transfer, description of command and time of service. *My husband belonged to Colonel Butler's Regiment, but I do not know the number of the Regiment or the title of the Company*
11. Name branch of service in which your husband served, whether infantry, cavalry, artillery, or the navy, or if commissioned as an officer by the President, his rank and line of duty, or if detailed for special service, under the law of conscription, the nature of such service, and time of service. *The regiment sent as a Cavalryman but was later transferred to the Infantry, that is, he was dismounted for some cause*
12. Have you transferred to others any property of any kind for the purpose of becoming a beneficiary under this law? *no*

Wherefore your petitioner prays that her application for a pension may be approved and such other proceedings be had in the premises as are required by law.

Enclosed please find application of Mrs. Victoria S. Hubbard for a Confederate pension. She has filed her affidavit in lieu of the testimony of witnesses as provided in the statute, and I recommend that she be granted a pension for she is a very deserving old lady in destitute circumstances. I have known her personally for thirty years, and I was well acquainted with her deceased husband during his lifetime, and I am fully convinced # from my own knowledge and from what I can find out from others that her husband was a Confederate soldier. Her first husband was a captain in the army, and she could make proof of his service, but as I understand the law she would not be entitled to a pension on his account, she having married again. She is basing her claim on her last husband's service.

Dear Mr. Hubbard:

I acknowledge receipt of your letter of June 7 in which you request the service record of James David Hubbard as a Confederate Soldier.

The records show that Mrs. Victoria Spencer Hubbard drew a Confederate Pension from the State of Texas under file number 33426 on the record of one Jim David Hubbard as a Confederate Soldier. The application for pension of Mrs. Hubbard states that Jim David Hubbard enlisted in Colonel Bulgers Regiment of Alabama Cavalry, C. S. A. and served four years, but was later transferred to the infantry.

No further information is given as to the military service of Jim David Hubbard as a Confederate Soldier. The exact dates of his enlistment and discharge is not given.

The application for pension was approved on the affidavits of witnesses.

You also ask for the record of Allison Frizzell as a Confederate Soldier.

I have examined the records of this office and I do not have any record of Allison Frizzell ever being a Confederate Pensioner of Texas and for this reason I am unable to furnish his service record. The only records we have on file are of those who have received a pension or whose widows have received a pension.
