I am the widow of W. M. Jackson, deceased, who departed this life on the 11 day of Nov, A. D. 1899, in the county of Hudson, in the State of Texas

I have not remarried since the death of my said husband, and I do solemnly swear that I was never divorced from my said husband, and that I never voluntarily abandoned him during his life, but remained his true, faithful and lawful wife up to the date of his death. I was married to him on the 11 day of Feb, A. D. 1868, in the county of Pickens, in the State of Alabama.

My husband, the said W. M. Jackson, enlisted and served in the military service of the Confederate States during the war between the States of the United States, and that he did not desert the Confederate Service. I have been a resident of the State of Texas since prior to January 1, A. D. 1900, and have been continuously since a citizen of the State of Texas. I do further state that I do not receive from any source whatever money or other means of support amounting in value to the sum of \$300.00 per annum, nor do I own in my own right, nor does anyone hold in trust for my benefit or use, estate or property, either real, personal or mixed, either in fee or for life, of the value of one thousand dollars, exclusive of the home of the value of not over \$1,000.00; nor do I receive any aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, or from any other source, and I do further state that the answers given to the following questions are true:

1. What is your age? 70
2. Where were you born? In Pickens Co Alabama
3. How long have you resided in the State of Texas? 14 years
4. How long have you resided in the county of your present residence? And what is your postoffice address? I have resided in Hudson Co 20 years - Post-office Athens, Tex
5. Did your husband draw a pension? If so, give his file number. My husband did not draw a pension
6. What was your husband's full name? William Marsh Jackson
7. What was the date of his death? Nov 11 - 1899
8. In what State was your husband's command originally organized? In Alabama
9. How long did your husband serve? If known to you give date of enlistment and discharge. He served about 4 years - I do not know date of enlistment or discharge
10. What was the name or letter of the company, or number of the battalion, regiment or battery of artillery in which your husband served? If he was transferred from one branch of service to another, give time of transfer, description of command and time of service. Co. D, 16th Confederate Cavalry
He was afterwards transferred to Co. I of the 7th Regiment

11. Name branch of service in which your husband served, whether infantry, cavalry, artillery or the navy, or if commissioned as an officer by the President, his rank and line of duty, or if detailed for special service, under the law of conscription, the nature of such service, and time of service.

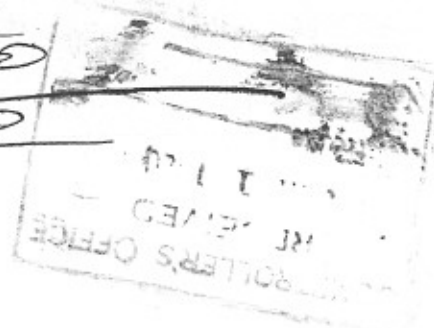

and I reside in Pickens County, Alabama and my Post Office address
is Noland, Alabama.

To the second interrogatory witness answers: I knew W. W. Jackson before and during the Civil War.

To the third Interrogatory witness answers: To my best recollection I knew W. W. Jackson for about fifteen years. I knew him as a young man, during the war and for several years after the war.

To the fourth Interrogatory W. W. Jackson enlisted in the service of the Confederate States as a soldier.

To the fifth Interrogatory witness states: That he does not remember the date of the enlistment of said W. W. Jackson, but that said W. W. Jackson was among the last to go out. He first joined Depree's Company Co. D. 16th Confederate Cavalry. He was afterward transferred to Ferguson's Co. I. I think of the 7th Alabama Regiment of Cavalry. I know that he was honorably discharged from the service.

To the sixth Interrogatory witness answers: W. W. Jackson was not an officer in the service but enlisted and served as a private.

To the seventh Interrogatory witness answers: W. W. Jackson volunteered for service as soon as he became of age and was not conscripted. He was in the regular service as a soldier and did not serve in the shops or armories.

CROSS INTERROGATORIES.

 In answer to Cross Interrogatory witness answers: I know of no other W. W. Jackson and I know of no other by that name who served as a Confederate soldier. I remember him well as a young man before the war and remember him as a soldier.

In answer to the second Cross Interrogatory witness answers: I am certain that said W. W. Jackson is the identical person who served as testified by me.

In answer to the third Cross Interrogatory witness answers: I know that said W. W. Jackson served honorably from the date of his enlistment to the end of the war between the States, and was honorably discharged.

In answer to fourth Cross Interrogatory witness answers: I know that W. W. Jackson did not desert his command but was honorably discharged.

 knew him in all about four or five years.

 know that the said W. W. Jackson enlisted in the service of the
 Confederacy, and performed the duties of a soldier.

To the fifth Interrogatory witness answers: W. W. Jackson
 was a member of a Company of which a man by the name of Durpree
 was captain and was attached to the 16th Confederate Cavalry. To
 the best of my recollection he enlisted in the fall of 1862 or early in 1863.
 He enlisted, I think, at Pickensville, Alabama. I don't know
 how long he was a member of said company as I was transferred to another
 Company soon after he enlisted.

To the sixth interrogatory witness answers: Said W. W. Jackson was
 not an officer in the service of the Confederacy.

To the seventh interrogatory witness answers: I do not know
 whether W. W. Jackson was detailed for any special service under the
 conscript law. (TX)

CROSS INTERROGATORIES

To the first Cross Interrogatory witness answers:

I enlisted in the same Company of which said W. W. Jackson was a member, I knew him at that time, but ^I was transferred to another Company and Regiment a few months after joining said Company. I never knew of another soldier by the name of W. W. Jackson.

To the second Cross Interrogatory witness answers: I am positively certain that the said W. W. Jackson is the same person serving as testified by me.

To the third cross Interrogatory witness answers: I do not know whether the said W. W. Jackson served honorably to the close of the war or until he was discharged from service.
