I am the widow of J. P. McDowell, deceased, who departed this life on the 22 day of May, A. D. 1918, in the county of Henderson in the State of Texas

I have not remarried since the death of my said husband, and I do solemnly swear that I was never divorced from my said husband, and that I never voluntarily abandoned him during his life, but remained his true, faithful and lawful wife up to the date of his death. I was married to him on the 19 day of Dec 1878, in the county of Beck, in the State of Louisiana

My husband, the said J. P. McDowell, enlisted and served in the military service of the Confederate States during the war between the States of the United States, and that he did not desert the Confederate service. I have been a resident of the State of Texas since prior to January 1, A. D. 1900, and have been continuously since a citizen of the State of Texas. I do further state that I do not receive from any source whatever money or other means of support amounting in value to the sum of \$300.00 per annum, nor do I own in my own right, nor does any one hold in trust for my benefit or use, estate or property, either real, personal or mixed, either in fee or for life, of the value of one thousand dollars, exclusive of the home of the value of not over \$1000; nor do I receive any aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, or from any other source, and I do further state that the answers given to the following questions are true:

3. How long have you resided in the State of Texas? 26
4. How long have you resided in the county of your present residence. And what is your postoffice address? 16 yrs - Athens Texas P. O. # 2

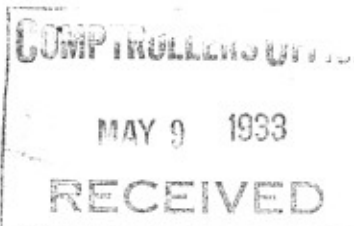

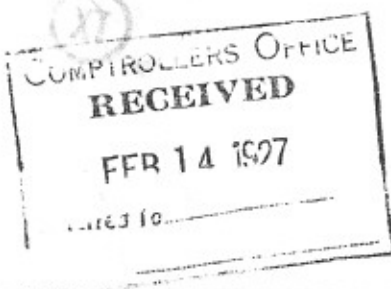

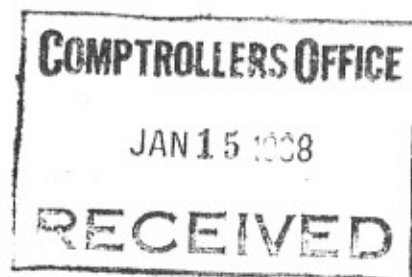

Dear Mrs. Parrott:

I acknowledge receipt of your letter of March 22 requesting information regarding Confederate Pension warrants which you think should have been issued to Mrs. Alice McDowell.

You are advised that on January 20, 1938 I had a letter from Mrs. McDowell from Parsons, Kansas in which she stated she left the State of Texas on December 21, 1937. No further Confederate Pension warrants were issued to her after this notice she gave me on January 20, 1938. Under the law of Texas, warrants will not issue to Confederate Pensioners during the time they are out of the State of Texas. However, if Mrs. McDowell should return to Texas within six months from the date she left the State, then after her return back warrants will issue to her for the time she has been absent. If for any reason she remains out of Texas longer than six months her application will be canceled and her name will be removed from the Confederate Pension roll. Mrs. McDowell was notified of this fact in my letter to her of January 17, 1938 addressed to her at 1019 South 21st Street, Parsons, Kansas in care of Mrs. A. Newman Johnson.

Dear Mrs. McDowell:

I acknowledge receipt of your letter of January 12, 1938 in which you request information as to whether or not your Confederate Pension warrants can be mailed to you at the above address.

You are advised the law of Texas permits Confederate Pensioners to temporarily leave the State and remain for a period of not more than six months during which time their right as pensioners is not effected except that no pension warrants issue during their absence.

If you should return to Texas within six months from the date of leaving then after your return back warrants will be issued to you for the time you have been absent. But if for any reason you should remain out of Texas longer than six months then your application will be canceled and your name will be removed from the pension roll, unless you return and file an application for reinstatement, which application may or may not be approved.

Your letter of the the twelfth is the first and only notice this office has had of you being absent from Texas. The law requires that on leaving the State pensioners shall notify this office of their going.

I am asking that you please at once furnish me the exact date on which you left Texas, and after your return you should immediately notify me of the exact date of your return.

No further warrants will be issued you during your absence.

Dear Mrs. Forester:

Replying to your letter of February 10,
notifying this office of Mrs. Alice McDowell's
absence from the State of Texas.

The law permits pensioners to temporarily
leave Texas and remain for a period of six months
during which time their right as a pensioner is in
no way effected except that during the time of their
absence no pension warrants will be issued to them.
If Mrs. McDowell should return to Texas within six months
from the date of leaving the State, then after her return
back warrants will be issued for the time she has been
absent. You should notify this office of the exact date
of her return to Texas.


The records of this office show that Warrant No.
33730, dated January 31, 1935 was mailed to Mrs. McDowell
at Tyler, Texas, General Delivery and the warrant has
never been returned to this office.

Where pensioners have left the State of Texas it is
the duty of the postmaster to return the warrants to this office
notifying me as to why delivery could not be made, as no
one other than the pensioner has the right to open or cash
these warrants and the law does not permit them to be
forwarded from one postoffice to another.

Dear Sir:-

I am in receipt of your letter of September 7, regarding the pension of Mrs. Alice McDowell who is drawing the Confederate pension and also receives an allotment from the U. S. Government on account of having a son in the services of the U. S. army.

I have held up this letter pending an opinion from the attorney general which I received today and am enclosing you herewith a copy of same. I regret exceedingly that I am compelled to remove Mrs. McDowell's name from the pension roll but must be guided by the law which plainly states that no applicant for a pension can receive more than three hundred dollars per annum. So long as present conditions exist I cannot authorize the issuance of any more pension warrants for Mrs. McDowell and will have to remove all names of pensioners having sons in the army and receiving aid from the Federal Government. I must do my duty and be guided by the law.



Replying to your letter of June 19 in regard to Confederate Pension payments which you think might be payable to the heirs of Mrs. Alice McDowell a Confederate Pensioner.

Under the present law of Texas Confederate Pension Warrants cannot issue to pensioners during the time they are out of the State of Texas, and you were notified of this fact in my letter of March 29, 1938.

If Mrs. McDowell had returned to Texas within six months from the date of leaving, then after her return back warrants would have issued to her for the time she had been absent. The records of this office show that she left the State of Texas about December, 1938 or the first of January, 1939 and her death occurred on May 18, 1939 in Kansas. For the reason that she never returned to Texas she was not entitled to Confederate Pension payments during her absence.

Inasmuch as the records show that it was her intention to return to Texas after a visit to Kansas then it was the opinion of this office under a ruling of the Attorney General of the State of Texas that her relatives were entitled to a Mortuary Warrant to help defray the burial expenses and on June 1, 1939 a Mortuary Warrant in the amount of \$100.00 was issued to Mrs. McDowell's nephew, A. Newman Johnson of Parsons, Kansas. This Mortuary Warrant was issued on proper application and an itemized statement furnished the Comptroller by the C. B. Fritz Funeral Home of Kansas.

I acknowledge receipt of your letter of December 30 in which you request information as to whether or not a Confederate Pensioner has the right to leave the State of Texas, and if so, how long they may remain out of the State without forfeiting their right as a pensioner.

The law permits Confederate Pensioners to temporarily leave Texas and remain for a period of not more than six months during which time your right as a pensioner would not be effected except that no warrants would issue during your absence. If you should return to Texas within six months from the date of leaving then after your return back warrants would issue for the time you have been absent. But if for any reason you should remain out of Texas longer than six months then no warrants would be issued to you and your name would be removed from the pension roll.

However, you would have the right, under this law, to at some time in the future return to Texas and file an application to be reinstated and on consideration of the application if you should be reinstated, then your payments would begin with the month succeeding the one in which your reinstatement application is approved. Under such condition it is the opinion of the Attorney General of the State of Texas that you would also be entitled at that time to payment for the first six months you were absent from the State.

All of this, of course, would be a matter to be determined by the State Comptroller on the evidence filed as to what your intention was at the time you left the State and during the time you were absent.

At the time you leave the State of Texas you should notify this office of the exact date you leave and the exact date of your return to Texas,

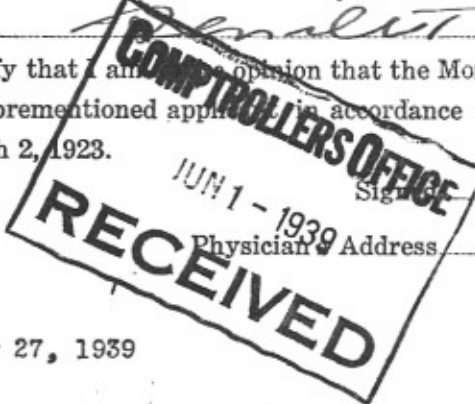
