No. 150, passed by the Forty-second Legislature at its Regular Session, and all other laws of this State relating thereto.

I served as a Confederate soldier (or sailor) in the war between the States of the United States; or (that I was a soldier who under special laws of the State of Texas during said war served in organizations for the protection of the frontier against Indian raiders or Mexican marauders); or (that I was a soldier of the militia of the State of Miss who was in active service during said war).

I served honorably from the date of my enlistment until the close of the war (or until I was discharged or paroled in some military organization regularly mustered into the army or navy of the Confederate States until the surrender). I was honorably discharged or surrendered at Pecos.

No. 150, passed by the Forty-second Legislature at its Regular Session, and all other laws of this State relating thereto.

I served as a Confederate soldier (or sailor) in the war between the States of the United States; or (that I was a soldier who under special laws of the State of Texas during said war served in organizations for the protection of the frontier against Indian raiders or Mexican marauders); or (that I was a soldier of the militia of the State of Miss. who was in active service during said war).

I served honorably from the date of my enlistment until the close of the war (or until I was discharged or paroled in some military organization regularly mustered into the army or navy of the Confed-

Dear Mr. McLendon:

I am in receipt of your application for Confederate pension, and in reply to my request to the War Department, Washington, D. C., for your service record as a Confederate soldier, I have received the following report:

"The records show that one James McLendon, name not found as J.C. McLendon, private, Co. G, 13th Regiment Mississippi Infantry, C. S. A., enlisted May 12, 1861, at Corinth, Miss. age 24 years. Company Muster Roll for July and Aug, 1864, last on file, shows him present, a Sergeant.

He was surrendered by General Robert E. Lee, C.S.A., and paroled at Appomattox Court House, Virginia, April 9, 1865.

His personal description is recorded as follows: Born in Mississippi; occupation, farmer; residence -- (Nearest P. O.) Nicholson's Store, and single."

From the information given in your application, I am quite sure the record of the man given in this report could not be the record made by you as a Confederate soldier, and before your application can be approved it will be necessary that you make proof of your service as required by the law of this State.
