R. E. Yantis was then introduced and addressed the Camp.

Ex-Senator J. J. Faulk was called for and responded in a fine speech.

George Owens of Van Zandt county made a short talk. He had just returned from a reunion of Parson's Brigade and reported a fine time. He also reported that Dr. T. M. Matthews, Sr, of Athens was elected brigade surgeon, although he was not able to be present.

The Camp then adjourned until the next annual meeting. Over forty comrades paid their dues.
