Soldier's Application for Confederate Pension

THE STATE OF TEXAS,

County of HendersonI, C. E. Waldron

do hereby make application for a pension, pursuant to the provisions of the First Section of Title 109, Revised Civil Statutes, 1925, providing for Confederate Pension, amended by Chapter 95, General Laws of the Fortieth Legislature, as amended by Senate Bill 287, Acts of the Regular Session of the Forty-first Legislature of the State of Texas, approved March 5, 1929, on the following ground:

I enlisted and served in the military service of the Confederate States during the war between the States of the United States and that I did not desert the Confederate service, but during the war I was loyal and true to my duty, and never at any time abandoned my post of duty in the said service; or (that I was in the service of the State of Texas during the war to protect said State against the Indians and Mexicans.)

That I was honorably discharged or surrendered

at Apomattox Court House, April 9-1865-

(Give date and cause.)

that I have been a bona fide citizen of this State since prior to January 1, A. D. 1920, and have been continuously since a citizen of the State of Texas. I do further state that I do not hold any National, State, city or county office which pays me a salary or fees of \$300.00 per annum, nor have I an income from any other employment or other source whatever which amounts to \$300.00 per annum, nor do I receive from any source whatever money or other means of support amounting in value to the sum of \$300.00 per annum, nor do I own in my own right, nor does anyone hold in trust for my benefit or use, nor does my wife own, nor does anyone hold in trust for my wife, estate or property either real, personal or mixed, either in fee or for life, of the assessed value of over one thousand dollars, exclusive of a home of the value of not more than \$2000.00; nor do I receive any aid or pension from any other State of the United States, and I do further state that the answers given to the following questions are true:

1. What is your age? 83 years old.
2. Where were you born? Coneucha County Ala.
3. How long have you resided in the State of Texas? 57 years.
4. In what county do you reside? Henderson
5. How long have you resided in said county? 57 years What is your postoffice address? Malatoff Texas
6. Have you applied for a pension under the Confederate pension law and been rejected? no

7. In what State was the command in which you served organized? Mississippi
8. What was your postoffice address at the time of enlistment? Waynesboro Miss.
9. How long did you serve? 1 1/2 years Give, if possible, the date of enlistment and discharge enlisted June 1863 - discharged 1865
10. What was the letter of your company, number of battalion, regiment or battery? Co B - 13th Miss Longstreet's Corp. Humphreys Div.
11. If transferred from one command to another, give time of transfer, name of command and time of service joined Co - B - 2nd Miss - then 13th Miss.
12. What branch of the service did you enlist in—infantry, cavalry, artillery or navy? Infantry TX
13. What is the assessed value of your home, if you own a home? none
14. What is the assessed value of your other property? none
15. Do you own any property other than that rendered for taxes in your county? If so, state value of same and county where located none
16. Have you transferred to others any property of any kind for the purpose of becoming a beneficiary under this law? no

Wherefore your petitioner prays that his application for a pension be approved and such other proceedings be had in the premises as are required by law.



Dear Mr. Waldrom:

Replying to your letter of July 3rd, you are advised as in my letter to you on June 17, 1930 that unless it can be shown that you rendered military service in some of the regular organizations of the Confederate States Army, it is not possible for you to receive a pension from the State of Texas, as the report from the War Department, Washington, D. C. shows that the service rendered by you was in the reserve or State troops of the State of Mississippi.

I am sorry that this is true but it is not within my power to grant pensions except in such cases where applicants are eligible under the law.

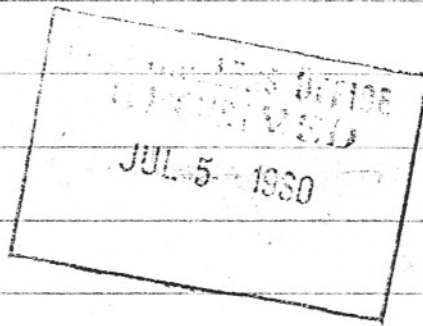

Dear Judge Coker:

Agreeable to my letter of June 9th, you are advised that I am now in receipt of a report from the War Department, Washington, D. C., in reply to my request for the military record of C. E. Waldrom as a Confederate soldier, which report follows:

"The name C. E. Waldrom has not been found on the muster rolls of any organization, State of Mississippi, C. S. A., nor has record been found of his service, capture or parole as of any organization of Infantry, State of Miss., C. S. Army designated Co. B, 2nd. Regiment, nor as of the 13th Miss. Inf., C. S. A.

The records show that one C. Waldrom, Co. B, 2nd, State Troops, Miss. Inf. (30 days, 1864) C. S. A., enlisted Aug. 23, 1864, at Wayne, for 30 days. Muster roll August 23 to Sept 17, 1864, (only roll on file,) shows him present, a Private. Capture, parole or later record not found.

One James E. Waldrom, who enlisted at Corinth, Miss., served in Co. B. 13th Miss. Inf., C. S. A."

Since this report identifies Mr. Waldrom as a member of Company B, 2nd State Troops of Mississippi, Infantry, he would not be entitled to pension under this service being a member of the Reserve or State Troops of Mississippi.

I note from the application, Mr. Waldrom claims to
